



## **Child Development & Caregiving 12**

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### **Introduction**

*Welcome to Child Development & Caregiving 12!* The goal of this 4 credit course is to provide students with the knowledge, skills and attitudes that will help them make informed decisions regarding child development and caregiving. Topics covered include: pregnancy; child birth and stages of social, cognitive, physical and emotional development from birth to age 12; child development theories; caregiving, legal rights and responsibilities.

This course is an excellent option for students considering careers in children, such as education, healthcare, recreation, mental health, and childcare, or for students who enjoy being around children or who plan to eventually become a parent one day in the future. This course is open to all students interested in the content, not limited to Grade 12, and applies to both the 2018 Graduation Program and the Adult Graduation Program.

### **Active Status Assignment**

All courses with Island ConnectEd require you to complete an Active Status Assignment that demonstrates you have worked with at least 5% of the learning outcomes for the course. The Active Status Assignments in Child Development & Caregiving 12 cover the following content:

- Engage in research and empathetic observation to determine service design opportunities and barriers
- Theories of child development, including cultural influences (ie. First Nations, Métis and Inuit family structures; own childhood experiences versus contrasting values as an adult)

- Critically reflect on cultural sensitivity and etiquette skills
- Service strategies for children and families

## Assessment

Your grade in this course is determined by the quality of work that you submit. Your grade is composed of Assignments, Quizzes, Unit Projects/Presentations and Self-Reflections. Grades are calculated according to the following weightings:

Active Status Assignment	5%
Assignments	35%
Projects	40%
Reflections/Self-Assessments	20%

Mastery is encouraged. Students who wish to improve their work and resubmit are invited to discuss their options with their teacher. When the authenticity of student work is in question, the teacher reserves the right to base final grades on teacher supervised assignments and assessments.
