Graduation Requirement

This is a 4-credit course. You must complete English First Peoples 12 or English Studies 12 to graduate. Both courses meet the Grade 12 English graduation requirement and are accepted by colleges and universities.

WHAT IS THIS COURSE ABOUT?

English First Peoples 12 explores Indigenous voices, stories, and perspectives through authentic First Peoples texts. You will read, view, listen to, and respond to a variety of texts, including oral stories, poetry, essays, short texts, and a novel.

This course asks you to think deeply about identity, land, language, voice, and reconciliation, while developing your skills as a reader, writer, and communicator. You will be encouraged to take thoughtful risks, reflect on your learning, and become more intentional and precise in how you express ideas.

- A range of assignments in different formats and genres, including personal responses, synthesis charts, expository, descriptive, and persuasive writing, as well as speaking tasks
- Self-assessment and reflection on your learning progress and growth

Your final mark will be based on your **overall body of work**, not on a single assignment.
