INTRODUCTION

Welcome to Social Justice 12! This course enables students to develop an understanding of the theoretical, social, and historical underpinnings of various equity and social justice issues and to analyze strategies for bringing about positive social change. Students will learn about historical and contemporary equity and social justice issues in Canada and globally. They will explore power relations and the impact of a variety of factors on equity and social justice. Students will develop and apply research skills and will design and implement a social action initiative relating to an equity or social justice issue.

The Social Justice 12 curriculum reflects the "big ideas" from the new curriculum:

- Social justice issues are interconnected
- Individual worldviews shape and inform the understanding of the social justice issues
- The cause of social injustice are complex and have lasting impacts on society
- Social justice initiatives can transform individuals and systems
